# **Calculating the Number of Degrees for Each Percentage**

The following is a sample that was not used in your assignment that compares how the land is used in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

#### **Bosnia and Herzegovina Land Use**

Arable Land	23%
Permanent Crops	3%
Pastureland	18%
Forest	28%
Other	28%
Total	100%

23% = .23 x 360 degrees = rounded to 83 degrees
3% = .03 x 360 degrees = rounded to 11 degrees
18% = .18 x 360 degrees = rounded to 65 degrees
$28\% = .28 \times 360 \text{ degrees} = \text{rounded to } 101 \text{ degrees}$
28% = .28 x 360 degrees = rounded to 101 degrees
