

Writing Prompt

Scoring Guide

Introduction (6 pts)

- 1) Introduce yourself as a reporter for the station.
- 2) State the name of the capital and the state on which you are reporting.
- 3) Explain that this segment is on state history and geography.

Why is the capital city located here? (10 pts)

- 1) Name at least 1 physical feature.
- 2) Name at least 1 human feature.

Conclusion (4 points)

1) End your segment with a conclusion.
