## Reading Guide Questions/Answer Key

- 1. Why was Parvana with her father in the market and not at school?

  Parvana was not in school because the Taliban did not allow girls to go to school.
- 2. Why did father call Parvana "Malali" when the Taliban soldiers came? Father called Parvana "Malali" because Malali was a heroine in Afghanistan who helped to lead an army into battle. He wanted her to be strong, like Malali, while he was gone.
- 3. What did the soldiers at the prison do with father's photo?

  The soldiers tore the picture into pieces, which Parvana gathered up after hiding them under her chador.
- 4. Why did Nooria send Parvana to get food for the family? Nooria sent Parvana because they had no more food, and Nooria was not allowed to go without a male escort.
- 5. Why didn't mother go to the market?

  The mother had been beaten by the soldiers when they went to the prison in an attempt to free father. She did not move from the toshak for days because she was depressed at their failure.
- 6. What plan did Mrs. Weera, Mother and Nooria come up with in order to feed the family? The plan was to change Parvana into a boy by cutting her hair and dressing her in boy's clothing so that she could shop for the family and later work to earn a living.
- 7. What job did Shauzia tell Paravna about so that they could make more money? The job was digging up bones from a bombed cemetery and selling them to a "bone broker."
- 8. What happened when Shauzia and Parvana went to the stadium to see a soccer game? When the girls went to the stadium they witnessed a group of prisoners being punished for theft by having their hands chopped off.
- 9. Why did Shauzia want to go to France? Shauzia wanted to go to France because her family was always fighting. She and her mother had to live with her father's family since he had died, and they had no other place to go.
